grates growing facilities, poultry housing, a potting room, storage, kitchen facilities, compost bins, a reference library, and a classroom. Written by the farm's owner/manager who is also a Permacul-

Bioshelter Market Garden ture teacher, the book describes how the bioshelter promotes greater biodiversity and is an energy efficient method of extending crop production through Penn-

sylvania's cold winter months.

Some of the topics covered include design and management of an intensive market garden farm, energy systems and bio-thermal resources, solar greenhouse design and management, ecological soil management and pest control, and wetlands.

The book is a satisfying combination of sustainable food production theory and excellent storytelling. If you're not currently planning to create a year-round food growing system in a cold climate, you just might be inspired to do so by the time you've read this book.



## Kids and Nature

Children are smarter, happier, and healthier when they have opportunities for free and unstructured outdoor play. The Children & Nature Network (www.childrenandnature.org) shares this idea and the research that backs it up.

Co-founded by Richard Louv, author of *Last Child in the Woods*, it provides news, research, and other useful information for researchers, parents, educators, and organizations dedicated to children's health and well-being.



As award-winning filmmaker Min Sook Lee discovers in her eye-opening, intimate and wryly funny documentary *My Toxic Baby*, it's not so easy going green if you're a new parent.

With her baby daughter on her hip, Lee embarks on a determined quest to find simple and affordable ways to reduce toxic threats, spurred to action after news reports of toy recalls and plastic baby bottles leaching bisphenol A fill her head with questions.
